It is difficult for us to even conceive of what daily survival might have been like in the Theresienstadt camp, in the Czech City of Terezin in 1942. There are few words to describe a "model ghetto" that tried to eradicate speech, language, culture and a people. Imagine then a figure huddled under the lights in the half-lit corridors intensely composing through the night.

Viktor Ullmann was part of the "Freizeitsgestaltung" (Leisure Organization) where he organized concerts, gave lectures, taught piano, directed, reviewed, and composed. This is the wonder of the creative human spirit, refusing to cower in the face of organized brutality. Viktor Ullmann took the faded corridor light and lit a spark of beauty and hope in the deepest depths of the Nazi concentration camp.

The presentation of *The Emperor of Atlantis* is a renewal of the spirit that created 22 such works in the short span of two years. Viktor Ullmann was taken from Terezin on October 16, 1944, and murdered at Auschwitz two days later. The legacy of his art and the spirit of those who died, lives on in his works.
